In term time, dinner is available on Monday & Wednesday evenings from 17:30 - 18:45 for Reuben members and guests.



Reuben Explores: The Anatomy of a Good Idea

<u>Paulo Savaget</u> (Associate Professor of Engineering) shows how "scrappy" organisations tackle seemingly intractable problems, such as illegal logging, caste discrimination, and diarrheal deaths, through workarounds that achieve massive wins with minimal resources. Savaget identified the four workarounds that these groups commonly employ – the piggyback, the loophole, the roundabout, and the next best – and demonstrates how to know which one to use when.

UK Assisted Dying Bill: Exploring Dissensus Through Dialogue

Chaired by Mehrunisha Suleman (Ethox Centre) there will be a discussion on the UK Assisted Dying Bill and areas of moral disagreement. Professor <u>Dominic</u> Wilkinson (Director of Medical Ethics) will be in conversation with <u>Jamie Hale</u> (multidisciplinary practitioner) exploring ways to move discussion forward.

Finding Cosmic Explosions with the ATLAS Virtual Research Assistant

Modern sky surveys can image the entire sky every night. In doing so, they discover new cosmic explosions. But the sky is vast and the alerts far too many for humans to keep up with. In this talk, Heloise Stevance will present how their Virtual Research Assistant for the Asteroid Terrestrial impact Last Alert System (ATLAS) sky survey has reduced her team workload by 80%, and comment on the importance of a "Data First" approach in the field of AI for Science.

Rethinking Risk: using Al and multimodal data to predict pesticide impacts on bees

Pesticide regulations are based on whether individual bees survive exposure, but many studies show serious sublethal effects on behaviour, physiology, and hive fitness. In this talk, <u>Rachel Parkinson</u> will present new tools to improve risk assessment: high-throughput behavioural testing with video and audio, and Al-driven methods to extract and model data from scientific literature. Together, these approaches offer a scalable, systems-level framework for predicting how stressors impact pollinators.

Tuesday Talks/DwD: Genetic Screening of Babies - is More Better?

Tuesday 13 May

Sequencing a person's genetic code is advancing, promising better detection and earlier diagnoses. Newborn screening in the UK is expanding from 9 treatable conditions to a 'pilot' covering 200+. The predictive power of genetic findings is often weaker than many assume; many babies need years of investigations before their risk can be clarified. In this talk, Anneke Lucassen (Professor of Genomic Medicine) will ask whether attempts to end 'diagnostic odysseys' that many babies with rare diseases face may lead to 'predictive odysseys' for many more.



Tuesday Talks/DwD: How Can We Tackle the "Constellation of Biases" Affecting the Care of Pregnant Women?

Tuesday 3 June

Research into prevention of severe complications in pregnancy has identified multiple reasons why pregnant women do not receive the same standard of care as the non-pregnant population. Concerning symptoms are often dismissed as being "normal for pregnancy", essential medications may be stopped and investigations such as x-rays may be inappropriately withheld.

Compounding the problem, pregnant and breastfeeding women are often excluded from clinical trials. At this seminar, <u>Marian Knight</u> (Professor of Maternal and Child Population Health) will give an overview of her research in the area and discuss some of the ethical challenges and opportunities to make a difference.

Pronouns

You may have noticed that we are asking, when booking onto events, whether you would like to include your pronouns on your place cards. **But why?** Pronouns are words we use in everyday language to refer to ourselves or others. They can be an important way to express your gender identity. 'I', 'me', 'she/her', 'he/him' and 'they/them' are some examples of pronouns. Some trans and gender non-conforming people may use 'they', 'them' and 'theirs' as personal pronouns. 'They' is considered a gender-neutral pronoun, compared to pronouns like 'he/him' or 'she/her' which are generally perceived as gendered terms.

Pronouns can be used to role model trans allyship, allowing others to see that inclusion is a key component of our College culture. For more information on why you might like to introduce yourself with your pronouns, and how to be inclusive of others doing so, please see here:
